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INTRODUCTION

The neo:XMR Binary is a 6x8 HDMI®/HDBaseT video matrix switch and the perfect product for routing multiple 4K UHD source devices to multiple locations within your environment. Supporting HDMI® 2.0 a/b, the latest HDCP 2.3 and 18Gbps bandwidth this is a must-have product in any residential multi-room control system integrating with the latest 4K UHD media devices.

Made in partnership with Binary, the Pulse-Eight neo:XMR Video & Audio Matrix has it all - with both audio and video inputs and video and audio outputs. Featuring 6 HDMI® inputs, 6 HDBaseT Outputs and 2 HDMI® outputs alongside 8 audio output zones (with the options of Stereo L/R, Optical and Digital Coax) and 4 audio input zones (with the option of Optical and Digital Coax). The neo:XMR Binary goes the distance, supporting up to full 4K/60, 4:4:4, 8bit or 4K/60 4:2:2, 12bit up to 100 meters (330 feet). With audio breakout, Dolby Digital compliance and support for multiple video control methods.

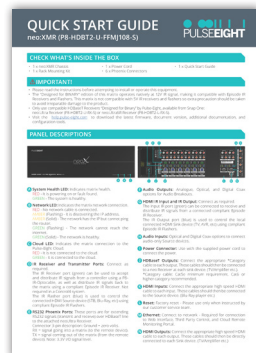

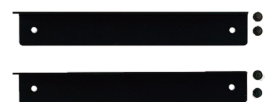

SAFETY PRECAUTION

Please read the instructions before attempting to install or operate this equipment.

Please keep the following in mind as you unpack and install this equipment:

- The “Designed for BINARY” edition of this matrix operates natively at 12V IR signal, making it compatible with Episode IR Receivers and Flashers. This matrix is not compatible with 5V IR receivers and flashers so extra precaution should be taken to avoid irreparable damage to the product. Please see IR Receiver and IR Flasher under the Compatible Devices section. Always follow basic safety precautions to reduce the risk of fire, electrical shock, and injury.
- To prevent fire or shock hazards, do not expose the unit to rain, or moisture or install this product near water.
- Never spill liquid of any kind on or into this product.
- Where possible, install the matrix towards the top of the rack to avoid the unit overheating.
- Only use the supplied IEC cable.
- Never push any objects into this product through any openings or empty slots in the unit as you may damage parts inside and/or cause an electrical shock.
- Do not allow anything to rest on the power cabling and avoid putting the weight of any kind on it.
- To protect the unit from overheating do not block any vents or openings in the unit housing that provides ventilation. Allow sufficient space for air to circulate around the unit.
- This product is intended for use in a clean (dust-free) residential environment.

Ventilation

It's important to keep the product well ventilated when installing this Pulse-Eight matrix.

Any electronic equipment will generate heat. A well-ventilated area helps to disperse the heat. If placed in a poorly ventilated area, your equipment may heat up and cause irreparable damage to the circuitries.

Allowing systems to run for prolonged periods under high temperatures will break down circuitry and electrical component. It also applies if the device is left in the path of direct sunlight or near any heat source.

Dust tends to accumulate and will disrupt the fan and electronics system. Dust particles contain various compositions like water, oil, and other minerals or chemicals. Having them in your electronic device can sometimes cause a signal error or degradation to the internal chips and circuitries. Because we cannot accurately predict how or when they can affect your device, we highly recommend that you keep Pulse-Eight products not only in a well-ventilated area but also as clean as possible.

In some cases, insects or reptiles can make nests near or inside the electronic casing. Whilst we design our products to maximize the protection of internal electronics, please be aware that insects and reptiles can be drawn to these types of habitats. In the unlikely event, this does happen, this will lead to poor ventilation inside the unit, and it will be unable to disperse heat effectively.

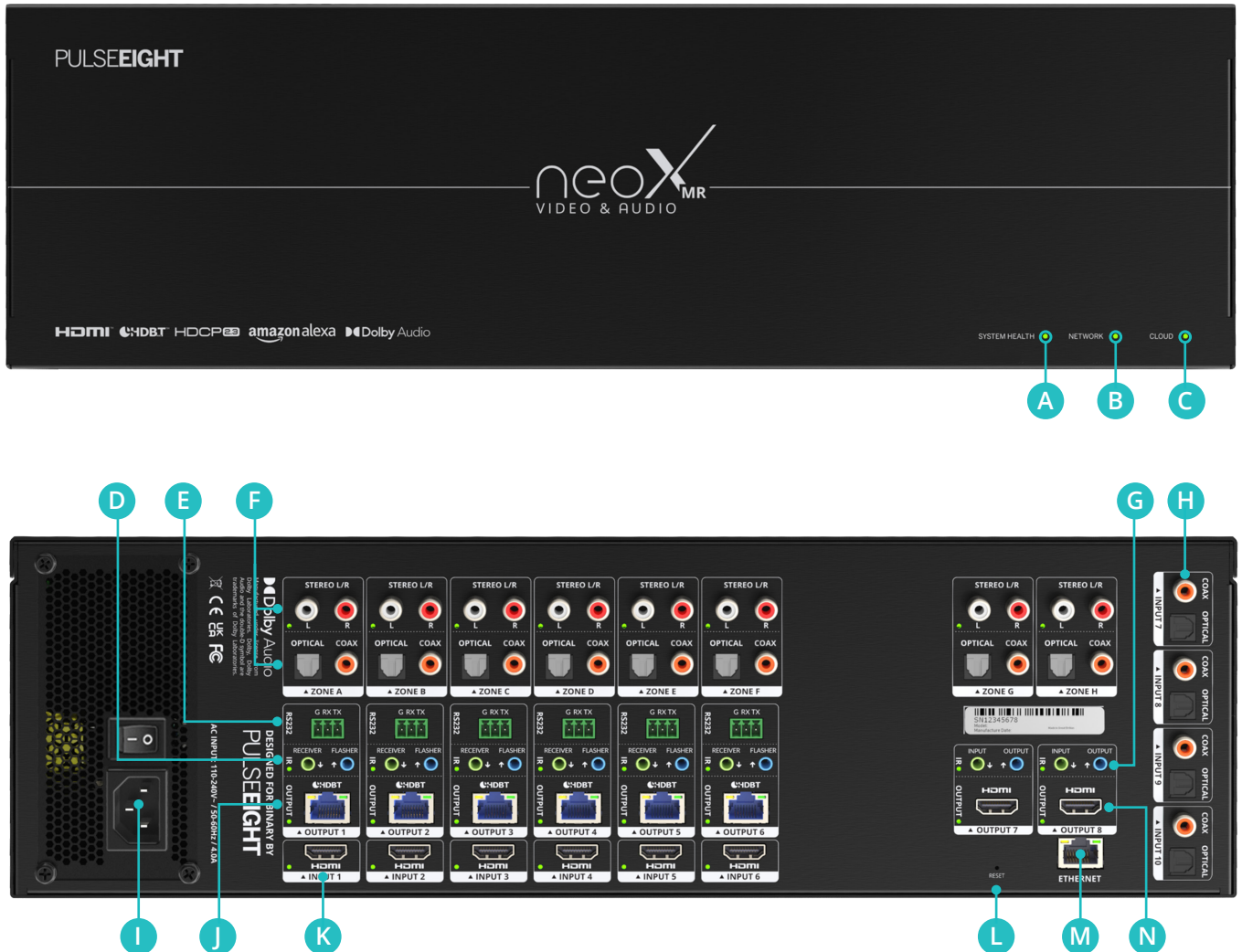
Finally, whenever possible, do not stack audio and video matrixes together. Leave enough space in between each unit in order to provide good airflow.

PANEL DESCRIPTIONS



- A System Health LED** indicates matrix health.
RED - It is powering on or fault found.
GREEN - The system is healthy.
- B Network LED** indicates the matrix network connection.
RED - No network cable is connected.
AMBER (Flashing) - It is discovering the IP address.
AMBER (Solid) - The network has the IP but cannot ping the router.
GREEN (Flashing) - The network cannot reach the internet.
GREEN (Solid) - The network is healthy.
- C Cloud LED** indicates the matrix connection to the Pulse-Eight Cloud.
RED - It is not connected to the cloud.
GREEN - It is connected to the cloud.

D IR Receiver and Transmitter Ports: Connect as required.

The IR Receiver port (green) can be used to accept and distribute IR signals from a controller using a P8-IR-Optocable, as well as distribute IR signals back to the matrix using a compliant Episode IR Receiver. Not required in a Control4 system.

The IR Flasher port (blue) is used to control the connected HDMI® Source device (STB, Blu-Ray, etc) using compliant Episode IR Flashers.

E RS232 Phoenix Ports: These ports are for extending RS232 signals (transmit and receive) over HDBaseT line to the attached neoUltra Receiver.

Connector 3-pin description: Ground = Zero volts. RX = signal going into a matrix (to the remote device). TX = signal coming out of the matrix (from the remote device). Note: 3.3V I/O signal level.

F Audio Outputs: Analog, Optical, and Digital Coax options for Audio Breakouts.

G HDMI® IR Input and IR Output connect as required.

The Input IR port (green) can be connected to receive and distribute IR signals from a connected compliant Episode IR Receiver.

The IR Output port (blue) is used to control the local connected HDMI® Sink device (TV, AVR, etc) using compliant Episode IR Flashers.

H Audio Inputs: Optical and Digital Coax options to connect audio-only Source devices.

I Power Connector is used with the supplied power cord to connect the power.

J HDBaseT Outputs: Connect the appropriate Cat 5e or higher grade cable to each output. These cables should then be connected to a neo Receiver at each Sink device. (TV/Amplifier etc.).

K HDMI® Inputs: Connect the appropriate high speed HDMI® cable to each input. These cables should then be connected to the Source device. (Blu-Ray player etc.)

L Reset: Factory reset - Please use only when instructed by our customer service team.

M Ethernet: Connect to network - Required for connection to Web Interface, Third Party Control, and Cloud Remote Monitoring Portal.

N HDMI® Outputs: Connect the appropriate high speed HDMI® cable to each output. These cables should then be directly connected to each Sink device. (TV/Amplifier etc.)

COMPATIBLE DEVICE

1. A compatible IR receiver is required when wanting to accept incoming IR signals - for example, from a remote control - to distribute and control other attached devices remotely. Compatible IR receivers are sold separately.

2. A compatible IR flasher or transmitter is required when wanting to output (blast) an IR command to an attached device. Compatible IR Flashers are sold separately.

3. An HDBaseT Receiver is required to interface between the neo:XMR HDBaseT outputs and an HDMI® device e.g. a monitor.



neo:Ultra Receiver (P8-HDBT2-U-RX-S)



neo:UltraSR Receiver (P8-HDBT2-L-RX-S)

*All compatible devices are sold separately and are available from Snap One.



- A IR Activity Indicator** - The LED will flash green when an IR signal is being received or transmitted.
- B IR Flasher (TX)** - The IR Flasher port (blue) is used to control the connected HDMI® Sink device (TV) using compliant Episode IR Flashers.
- C IR Receiver (RX)** - The IR Receiver port (green) can be used to distribute IR signals back to the matrix when connecting a compliant Episode IR Receiver.
- D HDBaseT Input** - Connect the appropriate category cable (Cat 6 or higher recommended) to the input of the receiver; these cables should then be connected to one of the HDBaseT outputs on the matrix. The LEDs will illuminate to indicate a link (amber LED) and video (green LED) is being received.
- E HDMI® Output** - Connect the appropriate high speed HDMI® cable to this port and connect to the sink device.
- F RS232** - Connect via 3-pin phoenix connector for RS232 passthrough over the HDBaseT line.
- G Ethernet** - Optional connections for using ethernet passthrough.


HDBASET CABLING

What Is The Best Type Of Cable To Use?

Pulse-Eight products use the HDBaseT standard, which makes use of standard Category (Cat) cables. The minimum cable used on a neo system is Cat 5e, but it is recommended to use a higher tier cable such as Cat 6, Cat 6A, or Cat 7 where possible because they have stricter twisted pair and shielding requirements that reduce data loss between data pairs.

Patch cabling is strongly discouraged because it can degrade the signal. Use a long, single high-quality cable for each HDBaseT port whenever possible to allow the system to function at its best.

We do not recommend using pre-made leads unless you are certain of the correct specifications (i.e., solid core 568B); using lower quality cables will result in signal degradation and transmission quality.

 *Note: Please keep in mind that Copper Clad Aluminum (CCA) cables aren't supported. This will cause a HDBaseT performance issue due to the inherent properties of a CCA.*

Shielded Cables

If you prefer shielded FTP cables, please use compatible shielded features such as grounding and termination. A faulty cable can increase interference rather than eliminate it.

Cabling Best Practice

Our recommended and best practise policy is to connect the Pulse-Eight matrix directly to the receiver using a straight cable. This will ensure the best signal quality and the greatest possible distance. On the HDBaseT Alliance website, you can find more information on "HDBaseT Best Practices."

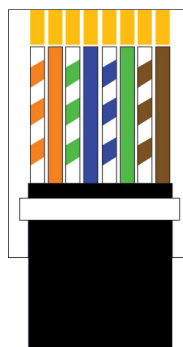
Wall Plates and Patch Panels


If the patch panels are properly terminated, there should be little distance loss. However, the use of wall plates and patch panels has the potential to increase cable resistance and, if not done correctly, could reduce advertised transmission lengths. Brush plates can be used instead of RJ45 wall plates to keep the finish neat.

Connection Termination

For Cat 5/Cat 6 UTP (unshielded) cable, we recommend using full plastic encasements rather than metal ones to avoid any grounding leaks into the Pulse-Eight products. However, when using shielded cables (STP), then please ensure to use metal connectors and that the Cat cable's shield/foil and drain wire are making good contact with the connector's shell.

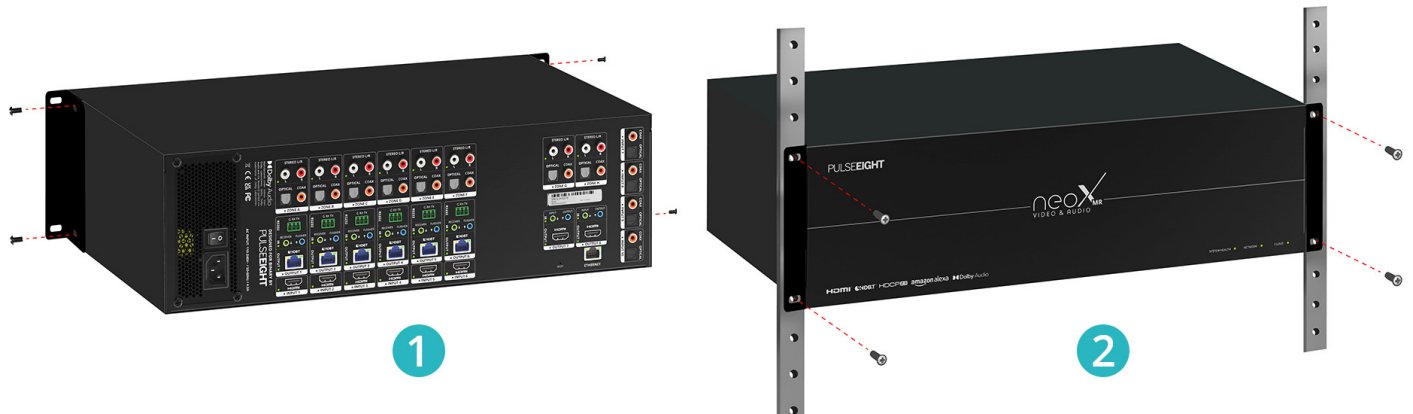
Terminate the cabling using RJ45 connectors to the 568B wiring standard. (See diagram below).



 **IMPORTANT:** Please note that local building regulations may apply to the installation of cabling in properties. It is important to check building regulations to guarantee that you are in accordance with the laws of your territory.

INSTALLATION

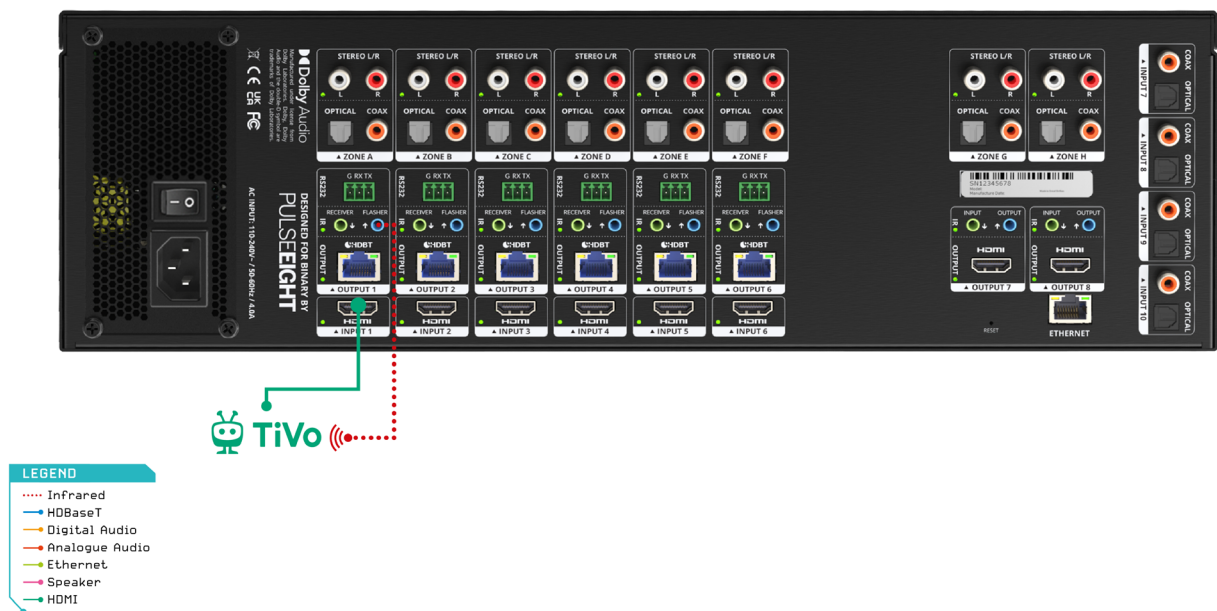
Installing In A Rack



1. Attach the rack ears to the front sides of the matrix using the provided screws.
2. Install into the rack and connect cabling according to the mode of operation – as described below.

⚠ WARNING: To prevent damage, it is important to ensure adequate ventilation space on the sides of the matrix, especially on the ventilation openings on the side of the product enclosure.

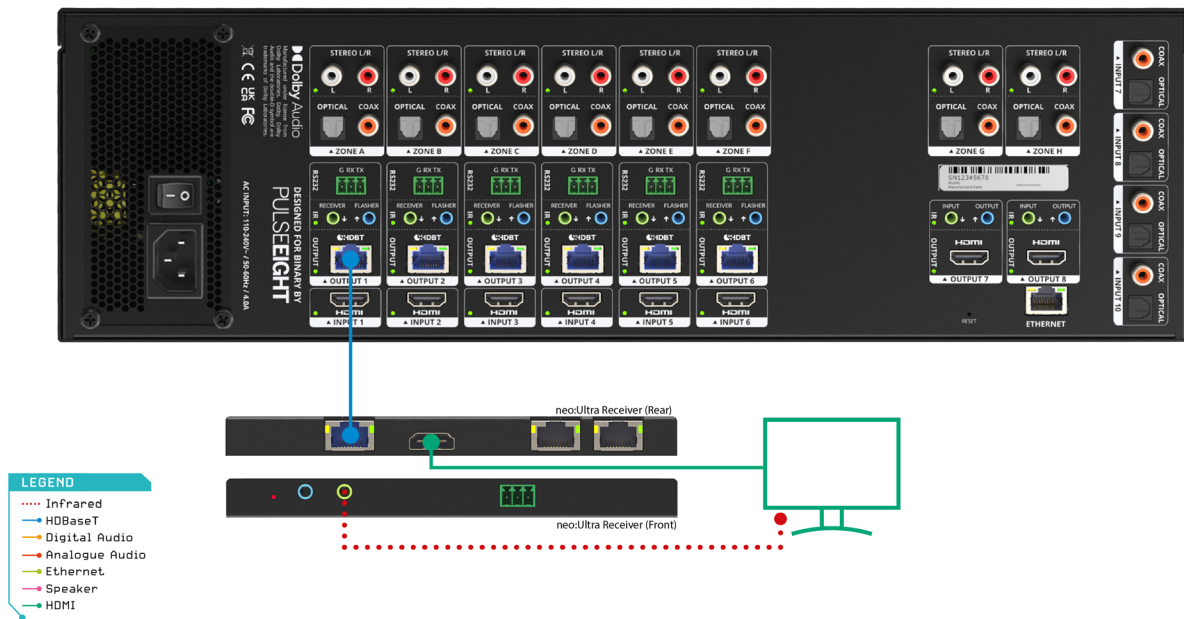
Connecting The Inputs



1. Connect HDMI® cables from your video sources (e.g. Blu-Ray player) to the HDMI® inputs of the matrix.
2. If required, connect the compatible IR Flasher (Emitter/Transmitter) cable to the 'Flasher' port (blue) on the matrix and the IR bud placed over the source device's IR window.

Note: It is recommended, for ease of setup, to connect devices from Input 1 to Input 6 first.

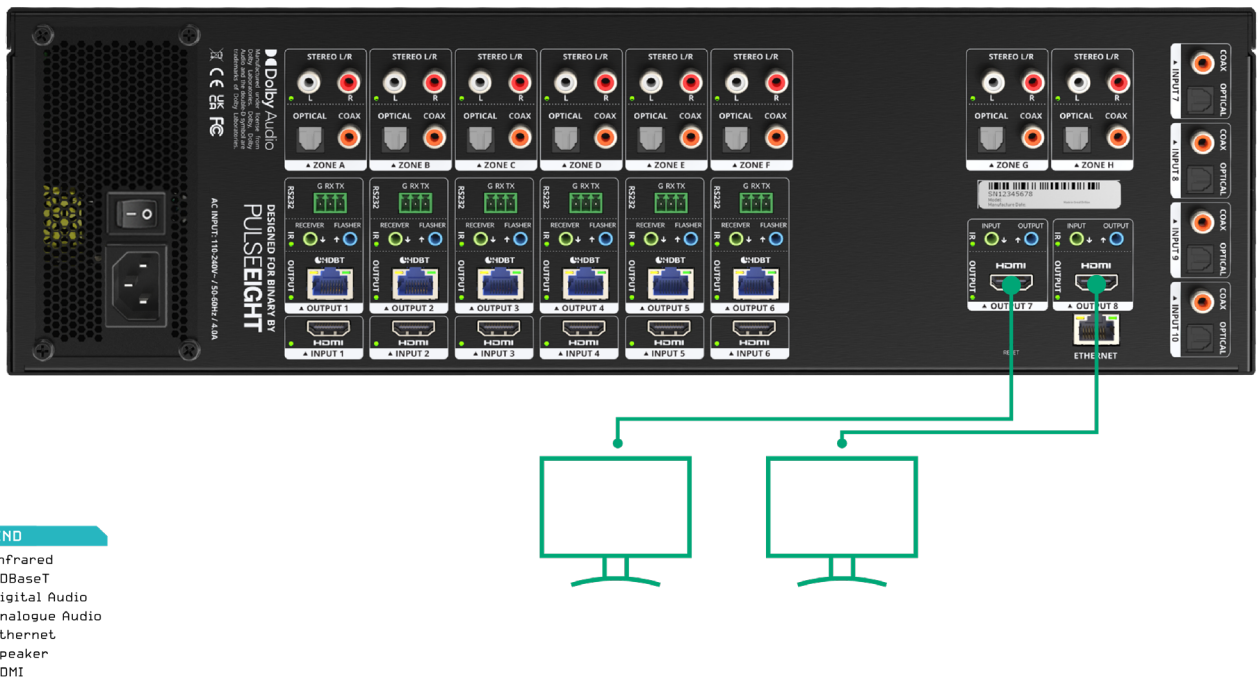
Connecting The HDBaseT Outputs



1. Connect the appropriate category cable (Cat 6 or higher recommended) to each HDBaseT output ports that you require.
2. Complete the connection by attaching the other end of the Cat cable to a supplied neo Receiver's 'HDBaseT In' port. The neo Receiver should be situated at the output end (i.e. next to the TV).
3. Connect HDMI® Out on the neo Receiver to the sink device (i.e. TV) using a high-speed HDMI® cable.
4. If required, connect the IR Receiver to the neo Receiver's 'IR Receiver' port (green) - and place the IR bud on the underside of the sink device (i.e. TV).

⚠ WARNING: Please make sure to use a compatible 12V IR receiver/transmitter on this product. Please refer to IR Receiver and IR Flasher in the Compatible Devices section.

Connecting The HDMI® Outputs



For Output ports 7 and 8, connect sink devices (e.g. TVs) directly via high speed HDMI® cables.

Note: Can also be used in conjunction with a Pulse-Eight neo HDMI® Extender Set (sold separately) for reaching further distances.

Connecting The Audio Inputs

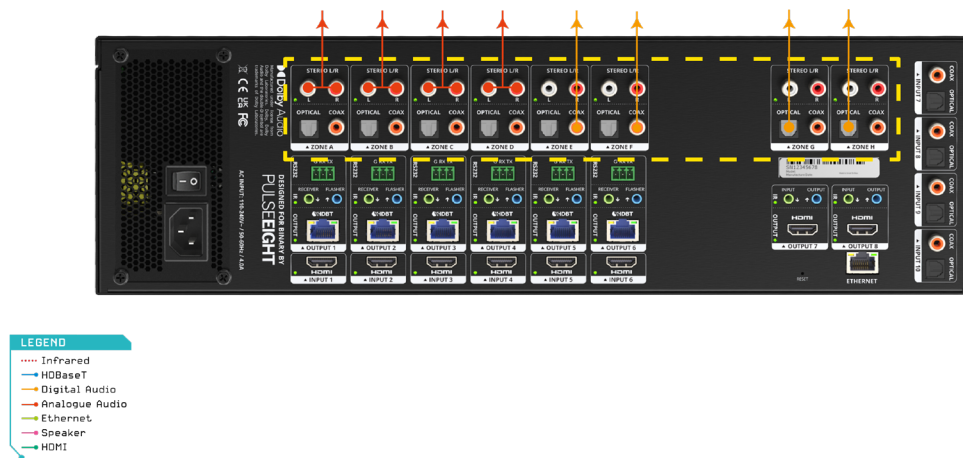


The neo:XMR features 4 zones of independent audio inputs. Connect your audio source device directly to either the digital coax or optical ports (Inputs 7-10).

Note: In the event that coax cable and optical cable are connected to the same audio input port, then the coax signal will always take priority.

The audio outputs allow matrixing of the audio inputs in Sink mode, please refer to Web Interface Setup and Digital Audio Input sections of this manual to find out more.

Connecting The Audio Outputs



If you wish to use the audio outputs from the matrix, please connect cables to the relevant output. There are 8 output zones, where each zone features Analog (stereo), Optical and Digital Coax options that can work simultaneously. The stereo outputs are able to automatically downmix multichannel audio streams based on AC-3 (up to Dolby Digital 5.1) down to 2-channel.

Note: The matrix does not support downmix of higher audio formats such as DolbyTrueHD or Atmos.

There are two audio modes of operation: **Source Mode** and **Sink Mode**.

By default, when you first install the matrix, the unit is set to sink mode with each zone set to passive.

IMPORTANT: The matrix needs to be set to Sink mode or Source mode according to the installation's requirement, and wired accordingly. Please ensure that you set up the matrix to the correct audio mode in the Audio Control tab of the WebUI.

SINK MODE VS SOURCE MODE

Sink Mode is the preferred method when setting up the neo:XMR Binary in an installation that does not have a dedicated audio matrix switch.

Sink mode allows for audio routing from any input to any of the audio output zones, which by default is intended to match the video routing.

There are two sub-modes of operation for each output zone:

- Passive mode is a fixed line-level output. It is recommended when connecting to an amplifier with its own volume control and other DSP functionality. Passive mode does not support HDMI-ARC.
- Active mode will activate the following features for that output zone:
 - Volume control of the stereo outputs
 - Audio delay of the stereo outputs
 - ARC (HDMI®). When feature is enabled, the matrix will automatically manage when audio is coming directly from the TV, over the HDMI® Audio Return Channel (ARC), and output over the respective audio zone output.

This sub-mode is recommended when connected to an audio amplifier without independent volume control.

Source Mode is generally used in larger installations where the input audio is being fed directly to one or more dedicated audio matrices (e.g. ProAudio switch).

In this mode, the audio outputs zones A to F are locked to HDMI® inputs 1 to 6 respectively, and with audio output zones G and H linked to audio inputs 7 and 8.

Digital audio inputs 9 and 10 are not operational in Source mode.

Connecting To The Network



It is necessary to connect a standard Ethernet cable (Category 5e/6/7) from the matrix's 'Ethernet' port to your router or network switch. Crossover cables are not supported.

Note: A network connection is required for supporting full control/remote monitoring features of the product.

Turning On The Matrix



1. Insert the supplied power cord and plug into the AC mains.
 2. Turn ON the power switch.
 3. As it powers ON, the front panel LEDs (System Health, Network, Cloud) will illuminate momentarily before it begins its initialization sequence.
- Note: The initialization process takes between 20 seconds and up to 2 minutes. However, it is possible that a firmware update may be available the first time the unit is powered ON - in this instance the matrix may take longer to initialize. If both the System Health and Network LEDs flash (green) quickly together then a firmware update is being applied. Please wait and do not disconnect the power until this update has completed.*
4. Once initialization has been completed, the System Health, Network and Cloud LEDs should all appear ON (green).
 5. Check the LED status on the attached neo Receivers to ensure correct installation and connection. See LED Status in Troubleshooting section.

Note: When a link is established between the Matrix and the Neo Receiver, the orange LED on the HDBaseT port on the Neo Receiver will illuminate (at this point you can assume that the neo receiver is powered on).

IR RECEIVER AND TRANSMITTER PORTS



This section is only required when utilizing IR flashers or Receivers in your installation.

1. The IR ports above the HDBaseT outputs work as follows:

- **RECEIVER** port (green) is a 3.5mm stereo socket that accepts an IR input signal coming into the matrix intended to be sent to another room over the HDBT output below. It extends the IR signal from the matrix to the attached neo Receiver's IR-Flasher port. You can connect these ports either with an Episode IR Receiver or directly to a 3rd party Control system processor/controller.

IMPORTANT: Please ensure the 12V DC for the 'IR Receiver' port is disabled (see web interface section) before connecting directly to any external controller and cable!

- **FLASHER** port (blue) is a 3.5mm mono socket output designed to attach an Episode IR Flasher to control the Source (Bluray, STB, etc) connected to the HDMI® input below. The original IR signal can come from any of the following:
 - "IP to IR Blasting" feature, exclusive to Control4, allows for an IP command to be converted to IR signal intended for the attached source. See more information on the "IR Blasting" section.
 - Any IR signal received by an attached neo Receiver will be routed back to the corresponding 'IR FLASHER' port, according to the video routing to that HDBT output – e.g. if the matrix is routing video from HDMI® In #2 on to HDBT out # 5, then any IR signal received by the neo Receiver attached to HDBT port #5 will be routed and blasted out the matrix's IR FLASHER port #2

2. The IR ports above the HDMI® outputs are a little different, which is why they are labeled differently:

- **INPUT** port (green) is only required when using an external HDBaseT extender. It is designed to receive the incoming IR signal from the HDBaseT set connected to the HDMI® output. The IR signal will then be routed to the corresponding 'IR FLASHER' port on the matrix according to the video routing.

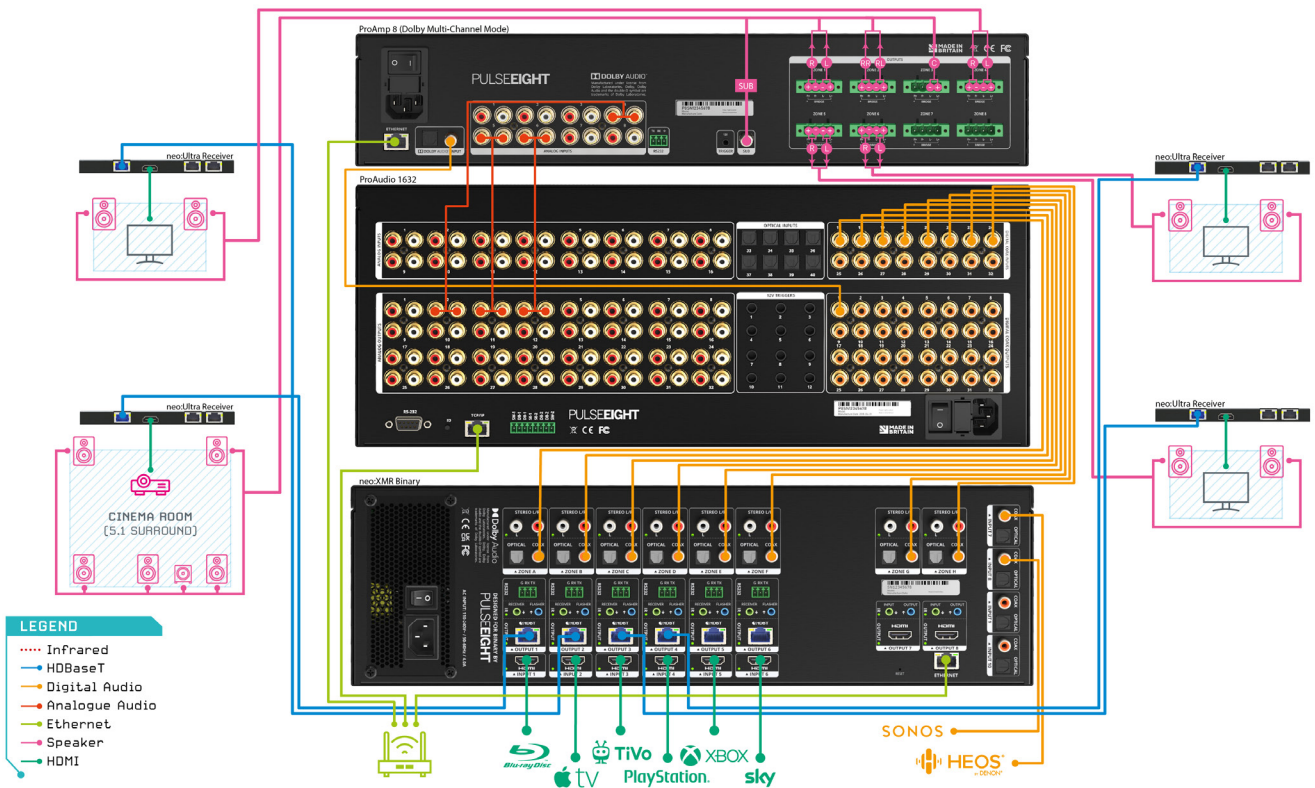
Note: If a display is connected locally (i.e. there is no HDBaseT extender set connected to HDMI® output) then this IR INPUT port should generally not be required in an installation.

- **OUTPUT** port (blue) supports "IP to IR Blasting" feature, exclusive to Control4, to control the display connected to that HDMI® output.

Note: The OUTPUT port is only required when there is a display connected locally that we want to control over IR signals.

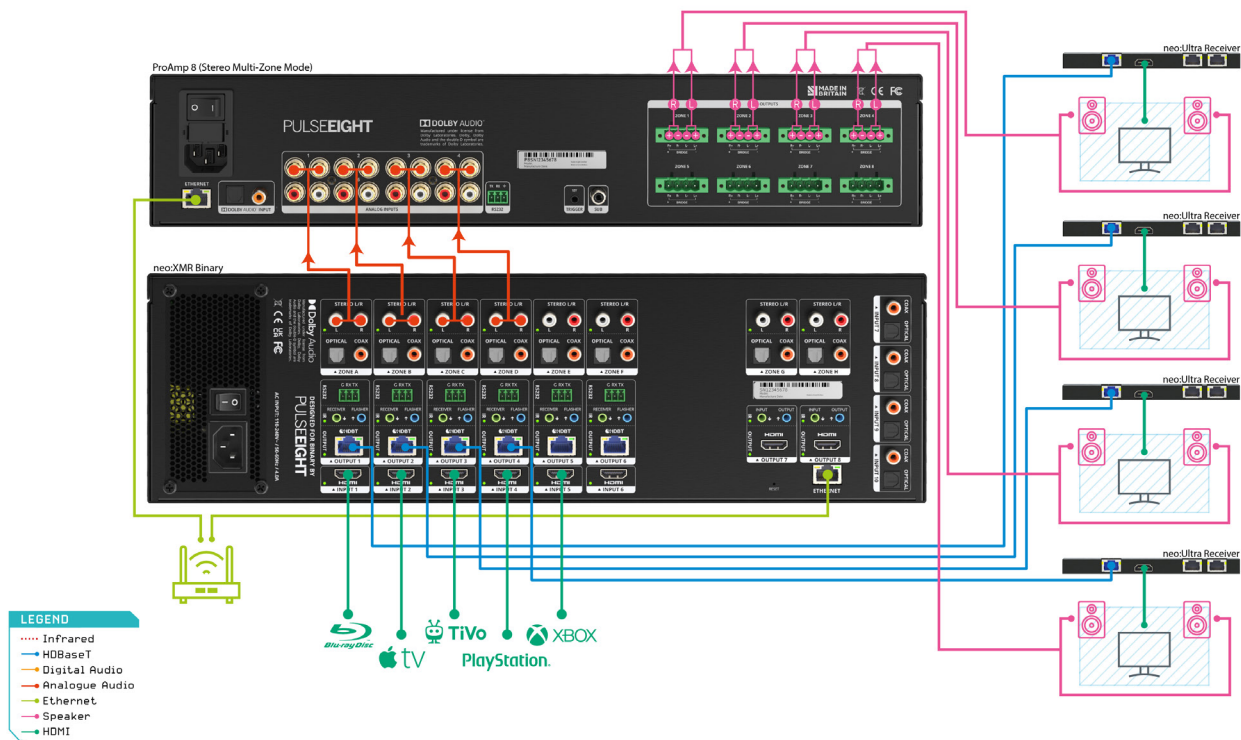
WIRING GUIDELINES

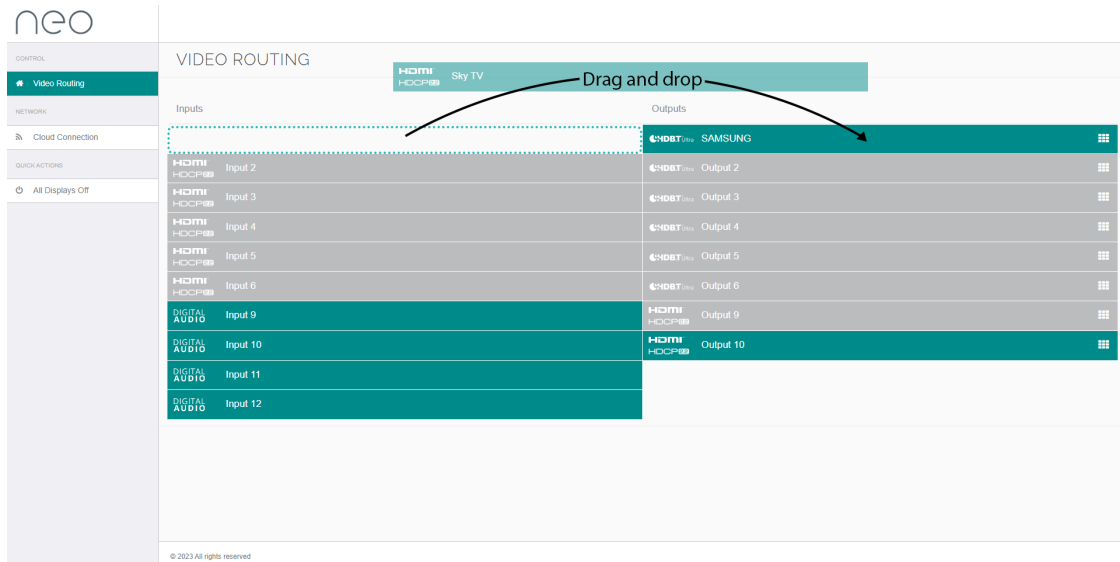
Sink Mode

NEO WEB INTERFACE

The front page of the web interface features a user-friendly drag and drop for video routing and display showing all available inputs and outputs. The following steps instruct how to access and customise this for the end-user.

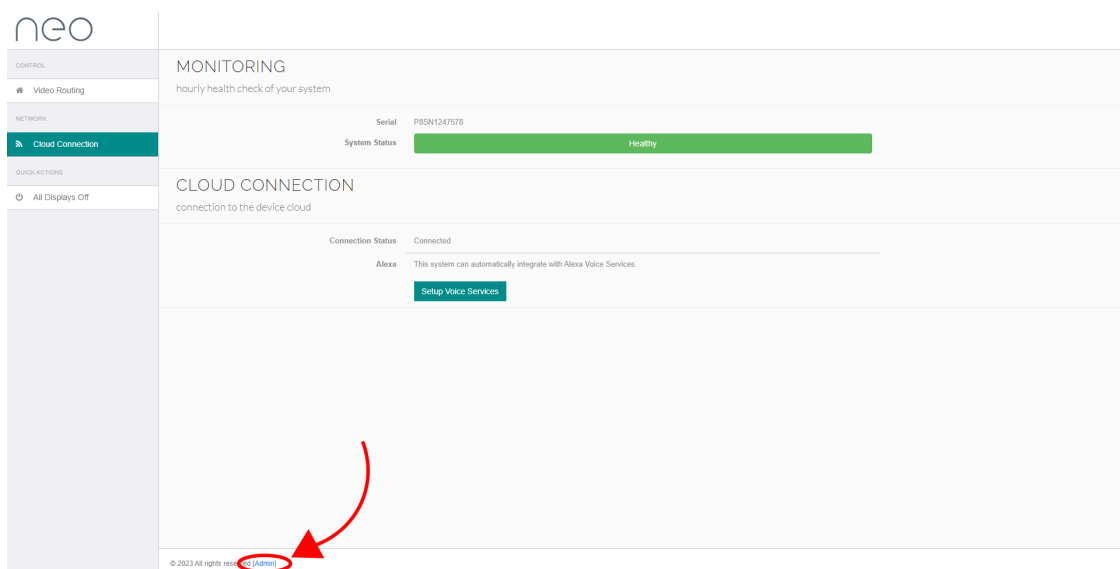


Accessing The Admin Area

When setting up the neo:XMR Binary matrix, it is important that the installer can access the admin menu on the Web Interface to configure the matrix according to the installation's requirements.


The Web Interface can be accessed using a computer connected to the same router/network as the matrix and by visiting www.gotomymatrix.com in your web browser. Navigate to the Cloud Connection tab (on the left-hand side) and then click on '[Admin]' link at the foot of the page. Insert your password to log in and access all options.

 *Note: The default password is "admin". It is recommended that this is changed to a unique and memorable password once setup has been completed.*



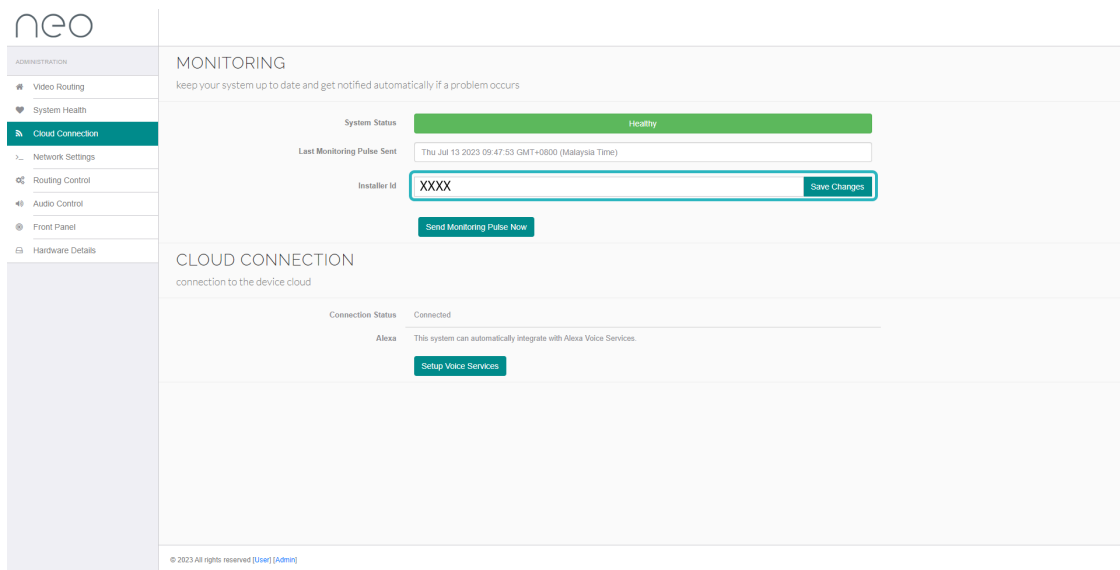
Link The Installer Account

On the Cloud Connection page, insert your Pulse-Eight Installer ID (4-digit) into the box and save changes - this will enable the matrix to be linked to your monitoring account.



 *Note: If you do not already have an Installer ID then you will need to register for a new account. Please contact your Snap One representative or visit monitoring.pulse-eight.com/Account/Register.*

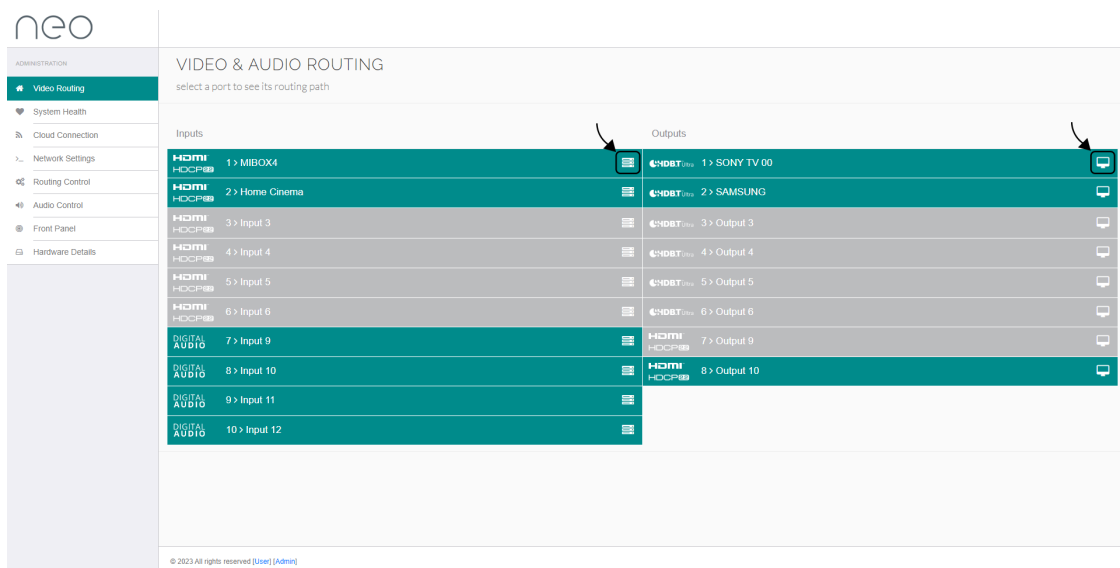
Once you have entered your Installer ID, you will be able to gain access to the Cloud Monitoring Service to monitor all of your Pulse-Eight installations remotely in one place.

Input and Output Options Setup

To access the Input and Output Setup options, click on the  symbol for changing the selected Input settings and the  symbol for changing the selected output settings.



Input Setup Options

Name: Change the name of the selected input. This name will be displayed on the source list on the display device (TV) menu.

Control Method: Change the control method for the supported Set Top Box. They are:

- CEC (default control)
- Sky UK
- TiVo/Virgin
- Kodi
- Dish
- DirecTV

If using IR blasting to control attached sources, then leave the control method as CEC (default)

Note: The listed Set Top Boxes (i.e Sky/Virgin/TiVo/Kodi/Dish/DirectTV) can be controlled automatically by the matrix over IP. You will need to enter the IP address of the STB.

The matrix will need to reboot for the changes to take effect and for the control to work.

Hidden: Turn on to hide the selected input from the end user's web interface.

EDID Profile: Drop down menu to select an alternative EDID profile for the selected Input. See the EDID Management section of this manual for more information.

EDID Details: This will bring up a page detailing the current EDID information for the selected Input.

Enable IR 12V: Turn on will enable a 12V DC voltage on the IR Receiver port (green) required to power a connected compliant Episode IR Receiver.

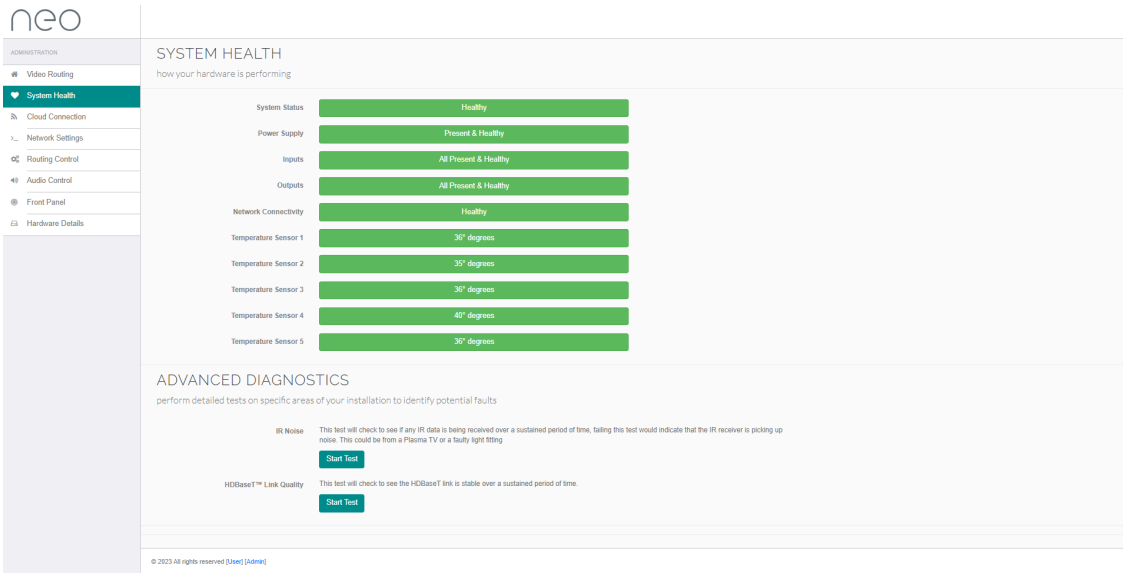
Cable Length: Indicates the approximate length of the Cat cable inserted into the output. This is an estimate based on the cable's performance and may not be accurate.

Linked Device: This allows you to link this device with other Pulse-Eight products (e.g. ProAudio and/or ProAmp8) in the same network and installation.

Audio Only Mode (HDMI® outputs only): When either of the HDMI® Outputs is set to mirror another video output port and saved, a new Option/Mode for that output port's settings will appear. The Audio Only Mode switch allows the matrix to use CEC commands to control the attached AVR volume. This works by the TV sending Volume control messages back to the matrix which are then passed to this mirrored port.

 *Note: Ensure that after any changes you click the 'Save Changes' button.*

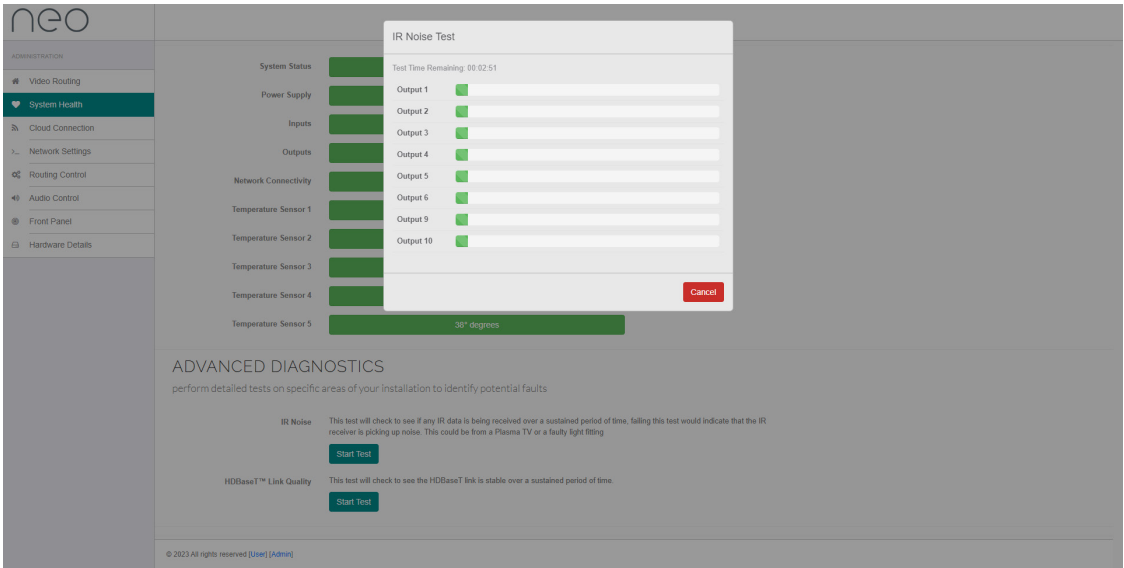
System Health



Under the System Health tab, information about the hardware’s performance is displayed. The colour-coded boxes(Green = Good, Orange = Warning, Red = Issue) will indicate if it is performing correctly along with the reading of the internal temperature sensor that will indicate if the system is overheating.

Under the System Health tab, you will also find Advanced Diagnostics that will perform detailed tests on specific areas of your installation to identify potential faults.

IR Noise Test



The IR Noise Test will check to see if any unwanted IR noise is being received over a sustained period of time for each port. Failing this test would indicate that the IR receiver on its video output zone (neo receiver) is picking up noise in its environment.

Example of failure message:
The IR receiver connected to this port is occasionally picking up stray IR messages, this may occasionally interrupt IR communication to the connected source device and/or control system. If you repeat this test and it remains in this state, we recommend relocating the IR emitter.

HDBaseT Link Quality Test



The HDBaseT Link Quality Test will check the HDBaseT link is stable over a sustained period of time. There are two drop down menus, the first is the output you are testing, the second is the type of test you are doing.

The **Mean Square Error** test is the ratio (in dB) of the signal power in relation to the originally transmitted signal vs the received and it is an analog measurement. This reading is directly affected by kinks, termination & other cable issues. Each Channel has a colour that represents the same colour in the twisted pair in the Cat cable. All four of these Channels should each be below the -15dB line. Otherwise, the cable quality will be marked as "Poor". Also, all four of these Channels should be within 3dB's of each other, for example, -21dB. -20dB. -21dB & -19dB. Otherwise, the cable quality will be marked as "Poor".

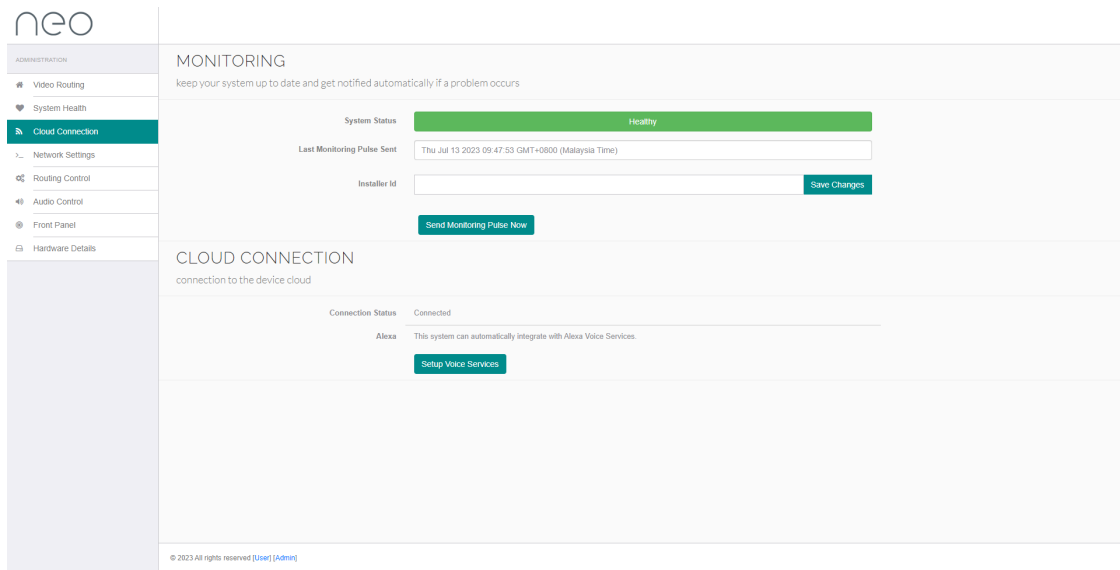
Note: If any of the above criteria is broken at any time but it then recovers to normal, this can still indicate an issue in the cabling so the matrix will remember this information and will continue to mark the cable as "Poor". This can explain if your cables look to meet the MSE test criteria but are still marked as "Poor" then it is likely to be caused by a momentary "bad spike" (reading below MSE criteria) happening in the past.

The **Channel Errors** test is a measurement of the number of digital errors on the channel, such as packet loss and bit errors. Each Channel has a colour that represents the same colour as the twisted pair in the Cat cable. All four of these Channels should be below the 40-line. Otherwise, the cable quality will be marked as "Poor". Also, all four of these Channels should be within 3 of each other, for example, 35. 36. 35. 34. Otherwise, the cable quality will be marked as "Poor".

Note: If any of the above criteria is broken at any time for any of the channels but it then recovers to normal, this can still indicate an issue in the cabling so the matrix will remember this information and will continue to mark the cable as "Poor". This can explain if your cables look to meet the Channel Error test criteria but are still marked as "Poor" then it is likely to be caused by a momentary "bad reading" (below Channel Error criteria) happening in the past.

It is also possible to check the link quality remotely by logging into your installer account at monitoring.pulse-eight.com

Cloud Connection



Under the Cloud Connection tab, you will have basic monitoring information:

System Status: This colour-coded (Green = Good, Orange = Warning, Red = Issue) status will notify you if the system is healthy or if there is an issue.

Last Monitoring Pulse Sent: This will indicate the date and time when the matrix last 'phoned home'.

Installer ID: Enter your Pulse-Eight Installer ID to link to the Pulse-Eight Monitoring Portal.


Connection Status: This will detail if the matrix is connected to the Pulse-Eight Monitoring Portal.


Alexa: This matrix can be controlled by Alexa's voice command control. To set this up, please follow the 'Alexa Voice Control' section for further details.

ALEXA VOICE CONTROL

It is possible to add the NeoX+ matrix to your Alexa smart-home setup in order to control the attached Sink and Sources using voice commands.

1. Install the 'neo' Alexa skill from Amazon on the Alexa app.
2. On the Cloud Connection tab, click the 'Setup Voice Services' button, this will take you to - my.pulse-eight.com with instructions on setup.
3. Click on the 'Login via Amazon' button and proceed to login to your Amazon account. A page will appear listing your discovered devices - these are the systems available for Alexa control. Click 'Connect' next to the appropriate system.
4. Tell Alexa to 'Discover Devices' - your system should now be connected.

 **Note:** Alexa is a virtual assistant AI technology developed by Amazon. It is capable of voice interaction with smart speakers, but it is also used to control smart devices in home automation systems.

 **IMPORTANT:** It should be noted that your Input and Output names on our webpage should begin differently. For example, if you have two inputs named Sky 1 and Sky 2, this can cause issues with Alexa. These should be renamed to something different, such as Mini Sky & Sky. The same applies to output names.

Normal operation of the CEC and IR control systems does not require any network connection, but IP-based API control or Web-based control does require a persistent network connection.

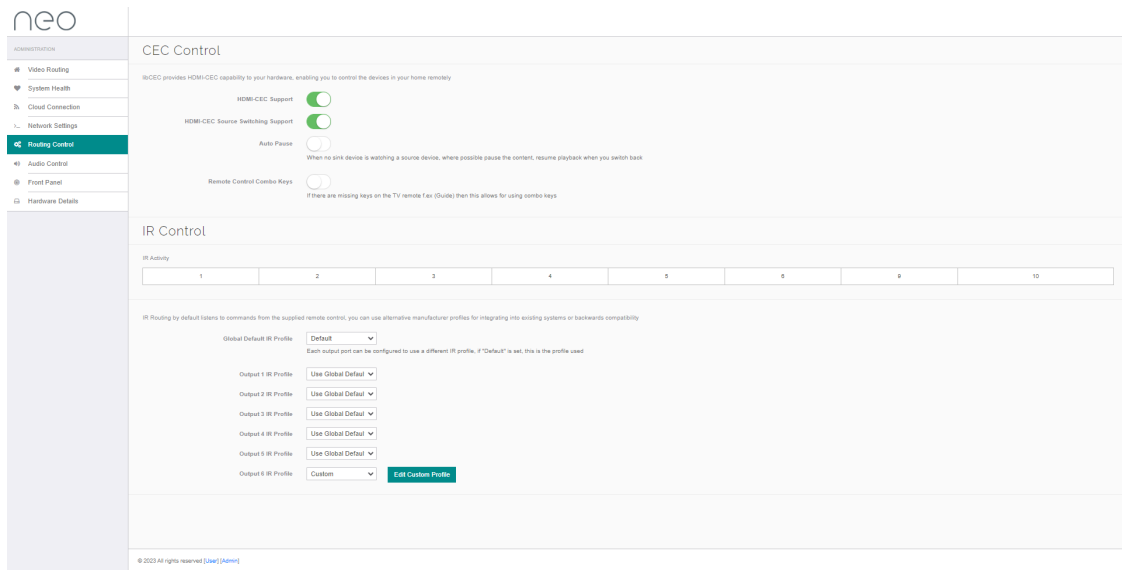
Discovery Tool

You can download a discovery tool from your monitoring portal at <http://monitoring.pulse-eight.com/> this program will run on Windows 7 or newer only. When run it will scan your network and detect the IP address of your matrix. If you have multiple neo devices on the same network, the discovery tool will only display the last found. If you do have more than one system, it is advised that you disconnect other systems first.

The discovery tool will display the IP address of the matrix, you can then access the matrix by typing that IP address into your web browser's address bar.

Note: It is recommended in this mode that you configure the networking to use a static IP address, this allows you to bookmark the page easily and return to the web interface easily without needing to run the discovery tool again.

Routing Control Tab



Under the Routing Control tab, you will find settings for CEC control and IR Control Section:

CEC Control

HDMI-CEC Support: Toggle switch to turn CEC control on or off, according to your requirements. By having CEC turned on, you will have the ability to control your connected devices (with CEC) without the need for a third-party Control system. The matrix can work independently. If no CEC features are used in the installation, then we recommend turning this off. However, please note that this will also disable HDMI® ARC as it utilises CEC.

HDMI® CEC Source Switching Support: This allows you to turn off/on the CEC source switching feature while keeping all other CEC features working, assuming that HDMI-CEC Support is still enabled.

Auto Pause: This feature utilises CEC and allows the matrix to automatically pause content from a Source (e.g. movie) when turning the TV off and then continue playing when routing the connected Source to another room. When the feature is not used, it is recommended to turn it off.

Remote Control Combo Keys: Toggle switch to turn on this function. If there are missing/broken keys on the TV's remote – e.g. the Guide button - then enabling this function allows you to use a combination of keys on the remote instead to achieve the missing function.

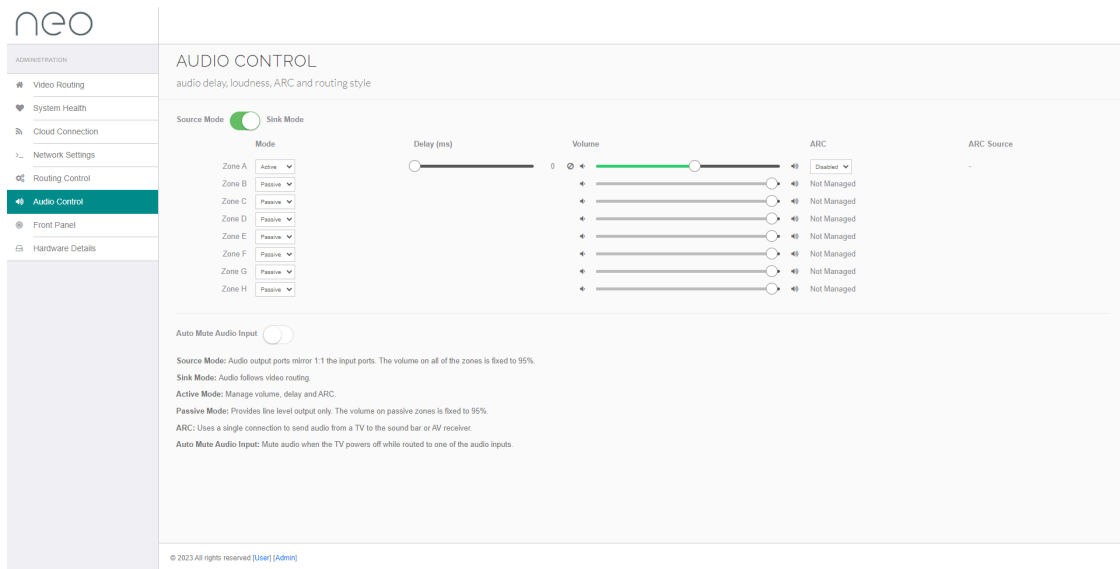
IR Control

IR Activity: A useful test for IR activity. The panel lists each IR activity box which will illuminate whenever an IR signal is received over the video output ports (HDBaseT or HDMI®).

IR Control Settings: IR Routing by default listens to commands from the supplied remote control to control the attached sources (e.g. play, pause, etc). However, you can also use alternative manufacturer profiles (e.g. Bang & Olufsen) for easily integrating into existing systems and backward compatibility.

Each output port can be configured to use a different IR profile, if "Default" is set, this is the profile used.

Audio Control



The Audio Control tab features audio routing settings for each audio output zone of the matrix.

Source Mode / Sink Mode switch. Toggle switch according to your installation requirements. See “Connecting The Audio Outputs” in the Setup section of this manual.

When using **sink mode**, the following settings appear for the individual Zone settings:

- Mode: Choose Passive for fixed line level stereo output. Choose Active to manage the volume and delay of the stereo output, and enable Audio Return Channel (ARC).

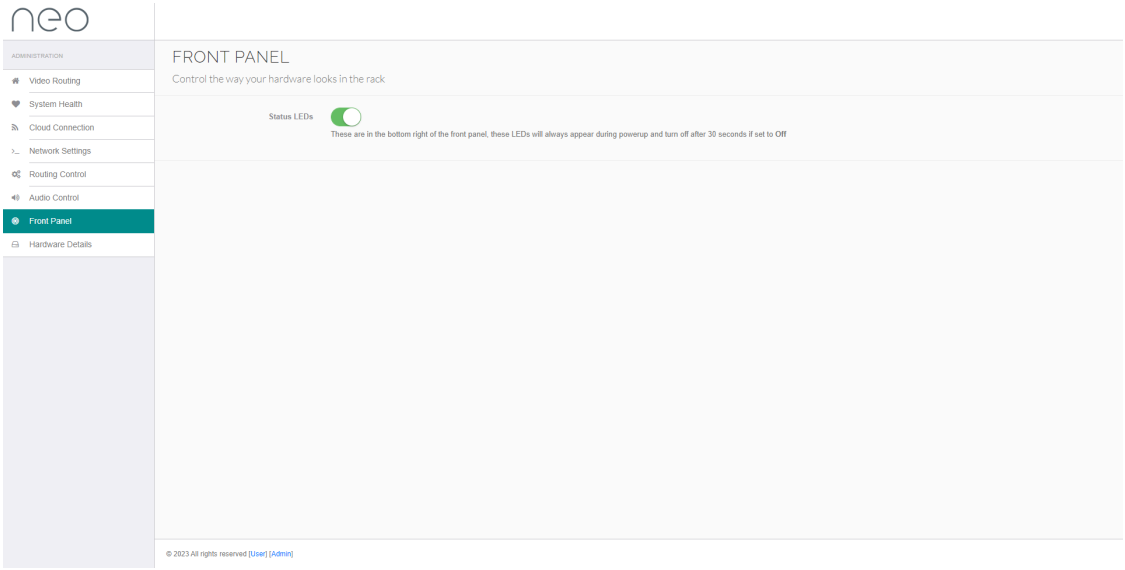

- Delay: A slider to adjust the audio delay up to 340ms

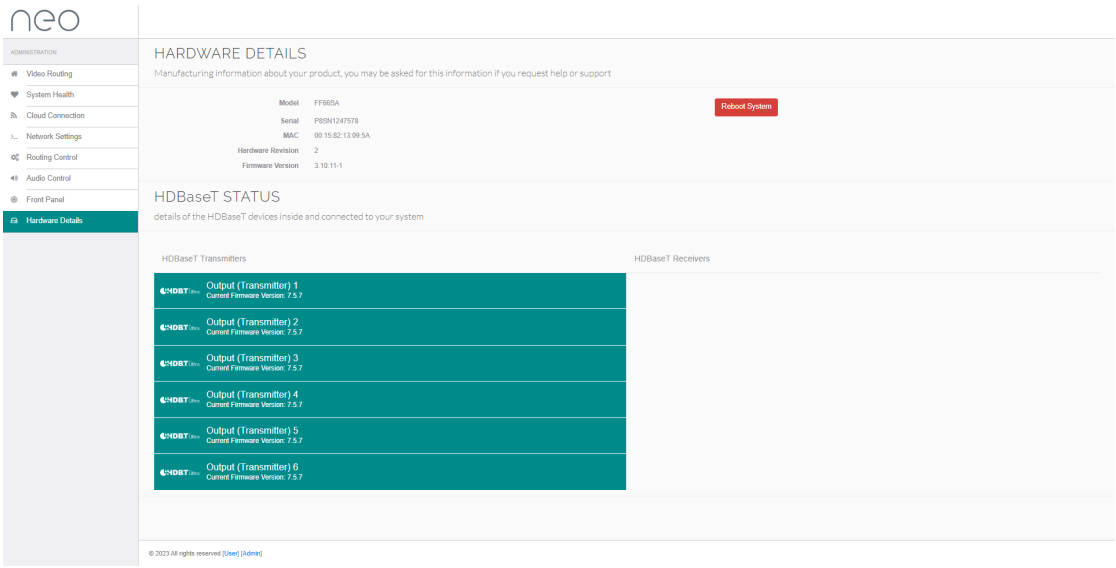

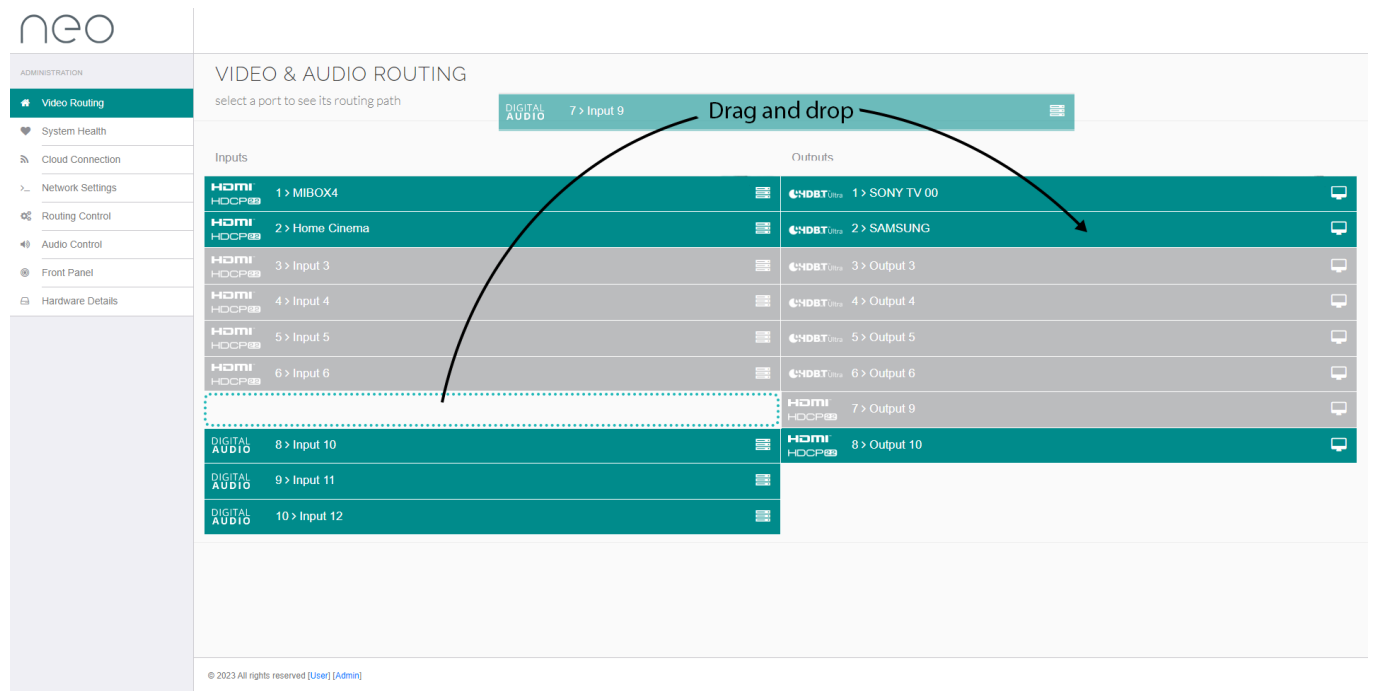

DIGITAL AUDIO INPUTS

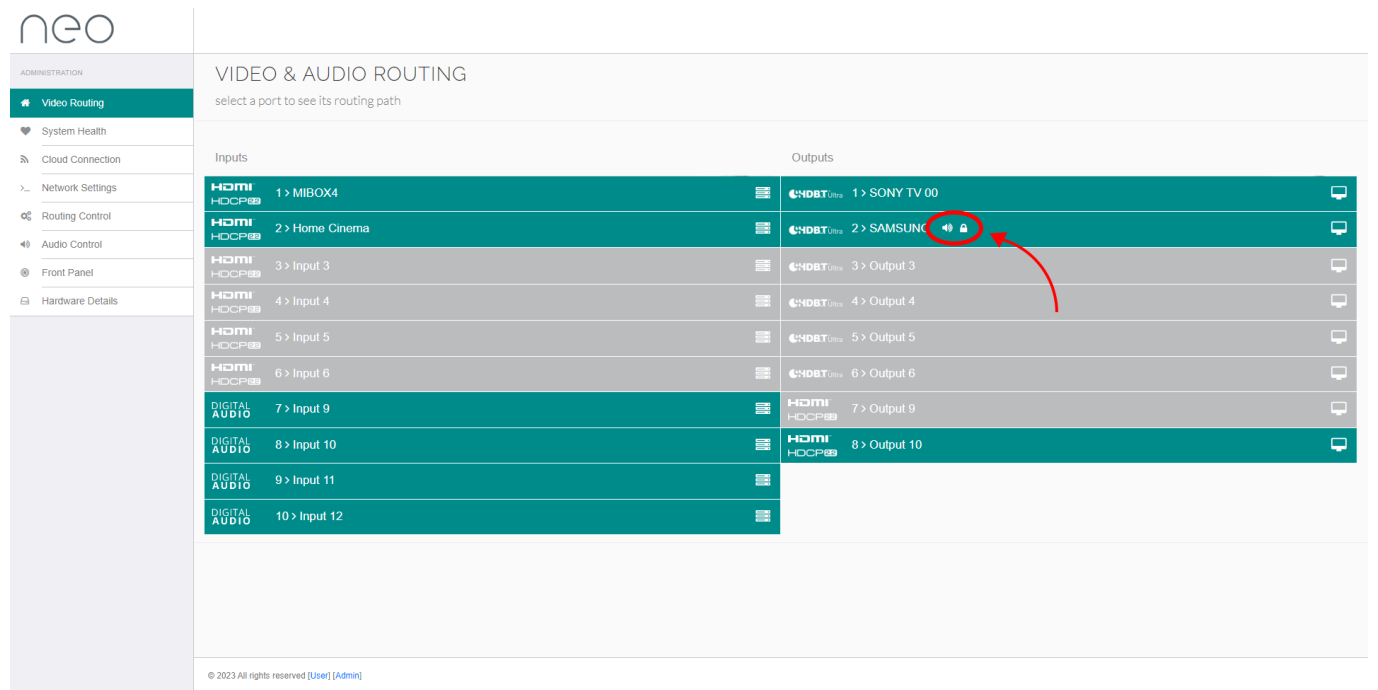
The neo:XMR offers four zones of independent digital audio inputs, with the option of using either digital coax or optical port per input.

These audio inputs can be matrixed to any audio output zone (A to H) when the unit is set to Sink mode. This can be done by dragging and dropping any of the Digital Audio Inputs (7-10) to any of the outputs on the WebUI's Video Routing.



Once the audio is being routed – for example, from input 9 to output 2 – then the audio from digital input 9 will come out of audio output zone C.

Notice that a small lock will also appear next to the Output 2 on the WebUI.



If you click on the lock to close it (see below), then the audio on output zone C will now always be fixed to Input 9, regardless of the video routing changes that might occur on output 2. Alternatively, if the lock is left open then the audio will change after a routing change to match the video.

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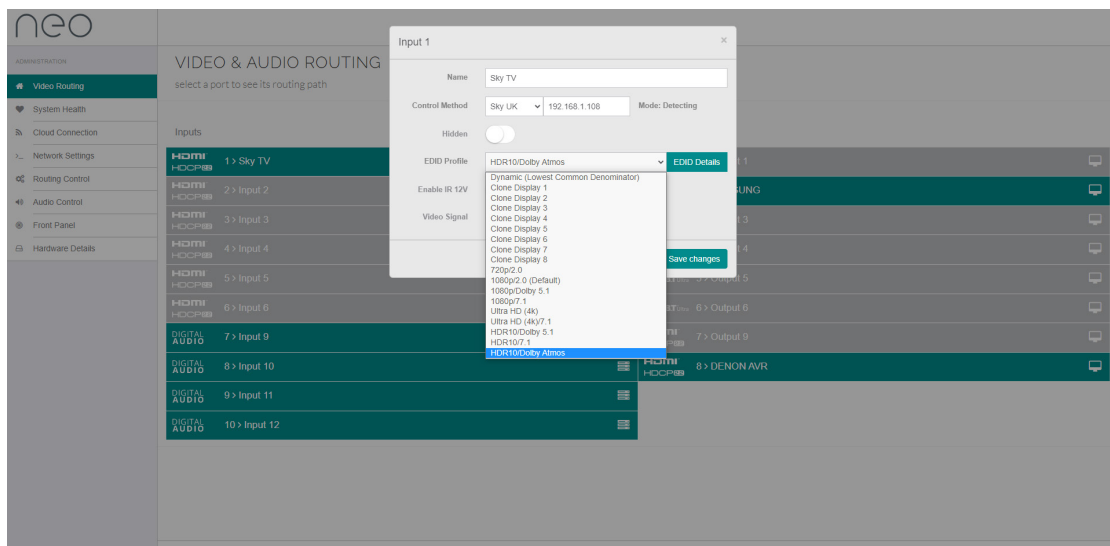
EDID MANAGEMENT

For your home entertainment to work with each other, Extended Display Identification Data or EDID is required by the source (e.g. media box, game console, etc) to identify what is the capability of the output screen. You may need to perform a “EDID handshake” when changing EDID profiles for it to work properly.

The neo video matrix contains EDID presets to ease the setup configuration - please refer to the “Video Routing (Admin)” in the Web Interface Setup section of this manual.

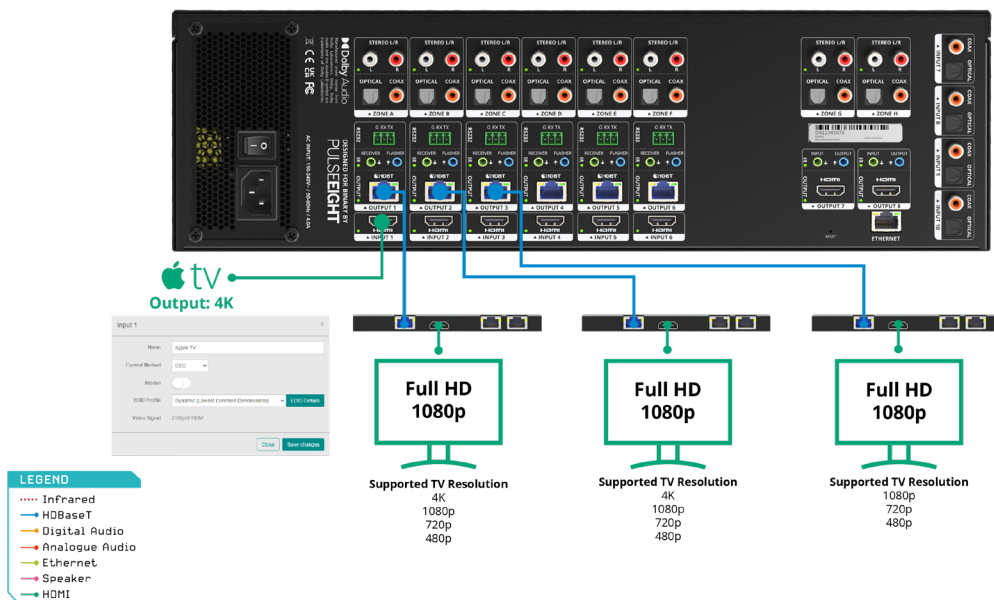
Types of EDID Profile available:

- Dynamic (Lowest Common Denominator): It will set the EDID to only support the resolutions supported by all the displays connected to the outputs.
- Clone Display: Copies the same EDID as the Sink (TV or AVR) attached to the selected output. This setting is recommended when connecting an AVR to the output as it ensures the AVR’s audio capabilities are reflected on the input EDID.
- HDR/UltraHD(4K)/1080p/720p: It sets the EDID to support 4K HDR/ 4K/ 1080p/720p as the maximum resolution supported, as well as some audio support.

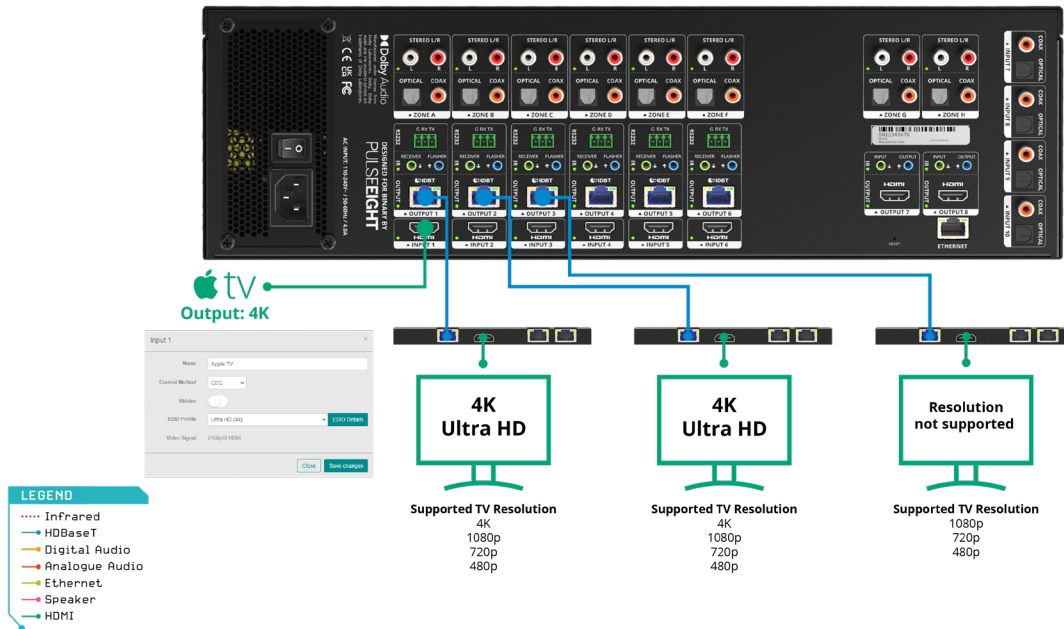


The matrix does not support individual video downscaling. If there is a mixture of displays with different resolution capabilities, then it is important to select the correct EDID profile and/or use an external downscaler.

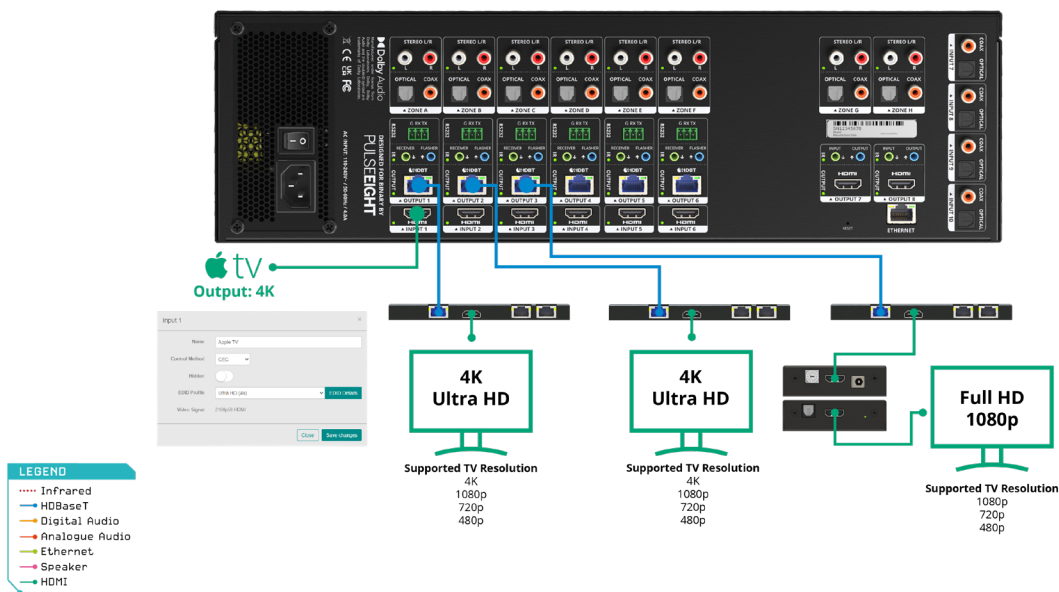
In this scenario, if Dynamic setting is selected, then the HDMI® Input 1 will limit the resolution of the source to a maximum of 1080p. This means all displays will receive a 1080p video signal.



In the same scenario, selecting 4K as the EDID profile will set the resolution to a maximum of 4K that is then distributed to all connected displays. Any legacy display (supporting up to 1080p only), will likely display an error or no picture.



When this occurs, it is possible to use a separate 4K Downscaler (e.g. P8-HDMI2-SP2-DS) which ensures that all displays receive the maximum resolution possible.



IR BLASTING

This feature is only available with Control4.

The Designed for Binary product range have the unique IP-to-IR logic inside, allowing it to output infrared commands (IR blasting) in a Control4 installation without the need for a cable between the EA controller and the matrix. There is no requirement for an IR optocable or complicated setup.

As long as the EA controller and the matrix are on the same network, then the driver can easily be configured to control and manage all video sources and displays flawlessly from your Control4 system through the neo:XMR matrix.

LINKED DEVICE



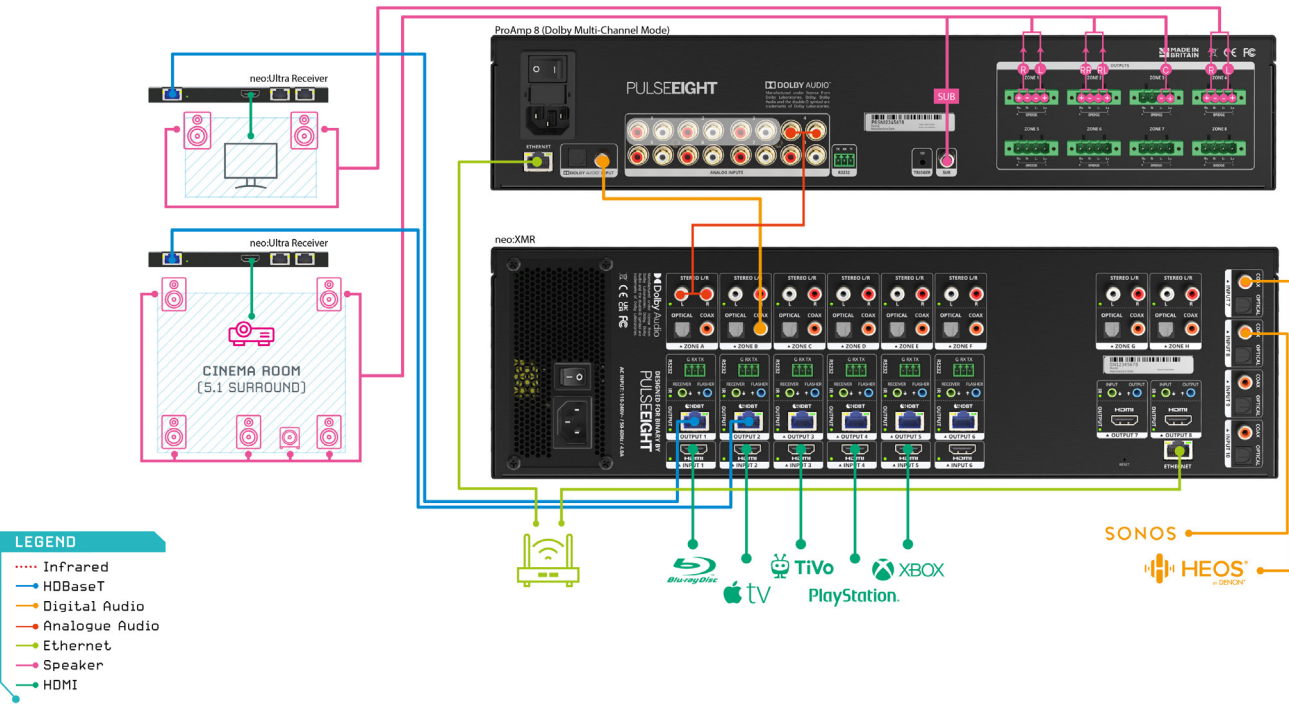
Any neo:XMR product can easily be linked with the Pulse-Eight ProAmp8, as part of the Linked Devices option. See Output Setup Options of the Web Management section.

This feature offers the ability to control the volume via the neo:XMR (through CEC) instead of going through the ProAmp8 web UI interface.

Make sure both neo:XMR and the ProAmp8 are connected to the local network as the system needs to detect each other to make the linking possible.

Connecting Linked Device

1. Here is the mapping and wiring diagram of an example setup.



2. To use the Linked Device feature, make sure to connect to the correct output. Here is an example of the setup: a S/PDIF connector is connected via Input 9 (on the ProAmp8) and Output 2 (on the neo:XMR).

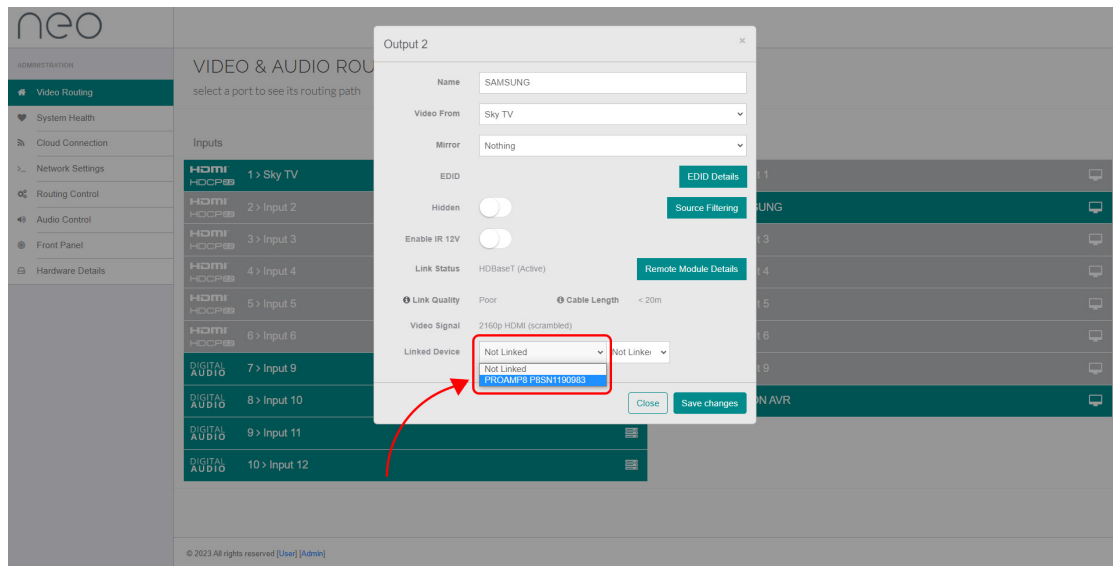

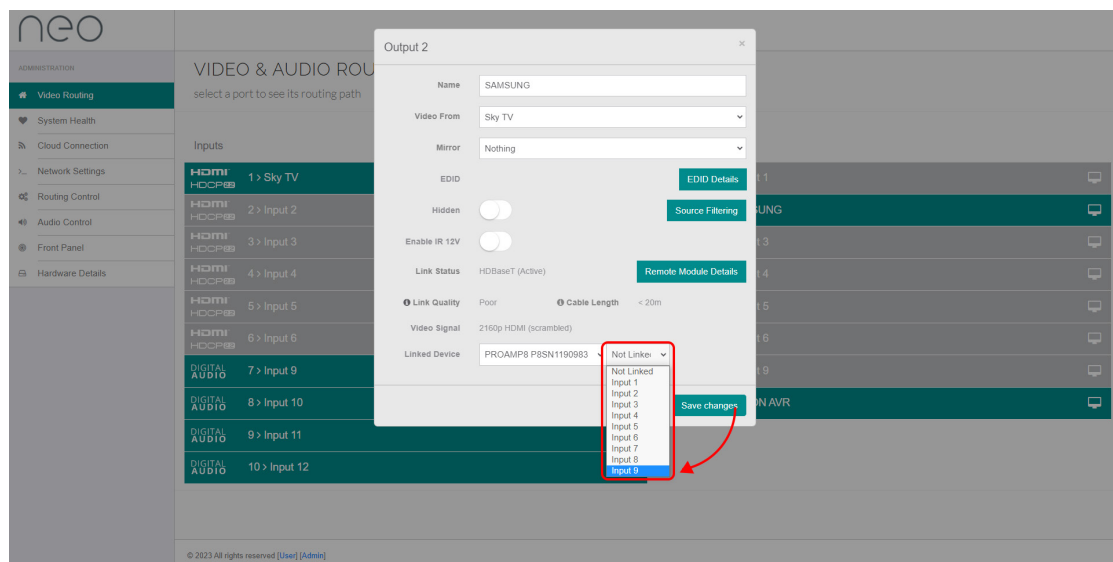

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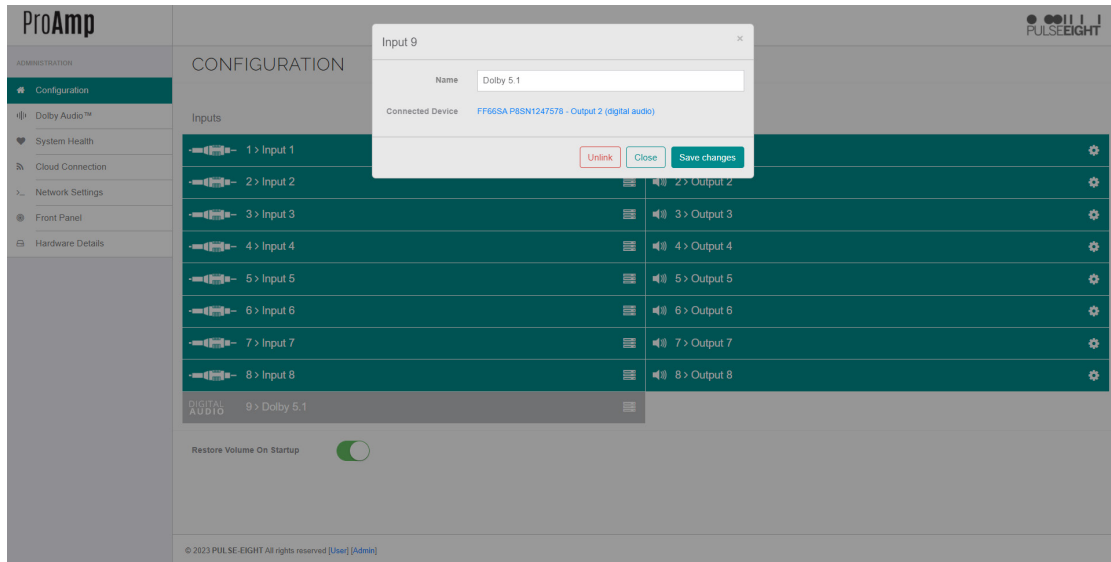
3. Next, on the neo:XMR web UI, go to Video Routing and under the Output section, click on the icon.



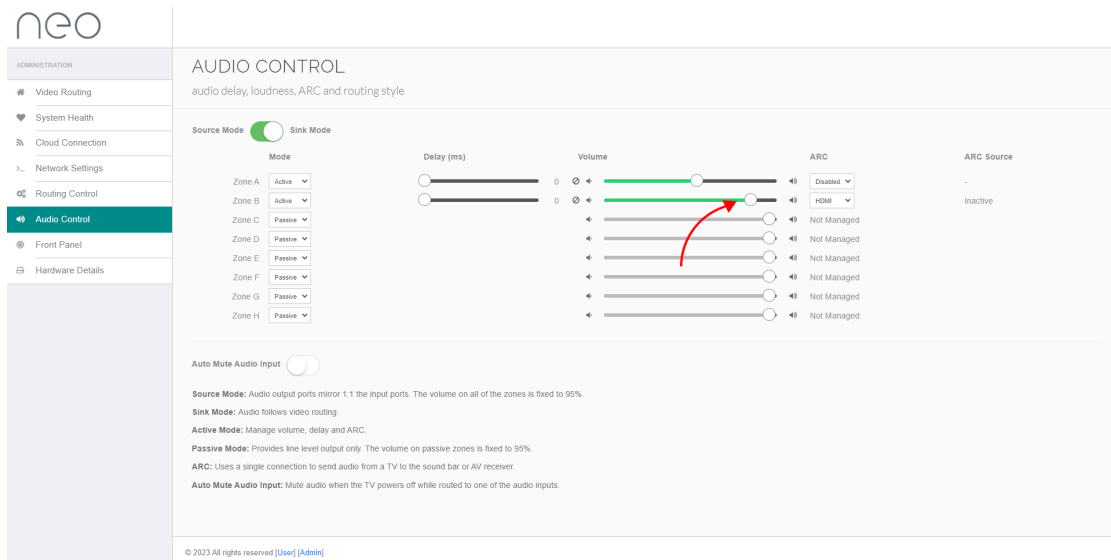
4. Once the Output window is up, select the ProAmp8 on the Linked Device section and select Input 9 (as reflected as the Input on the ProAmp8).



- To make sure it is working, login into the ProAmp8 web UI (Go to <http://gotomymatrix.com/> and choose ProAmp8).
Then click the Configuration tab and click on the icon to check if it is Output 2. Make sure they are connected to the neo:XMR correct output (which is Output 2 in this case).

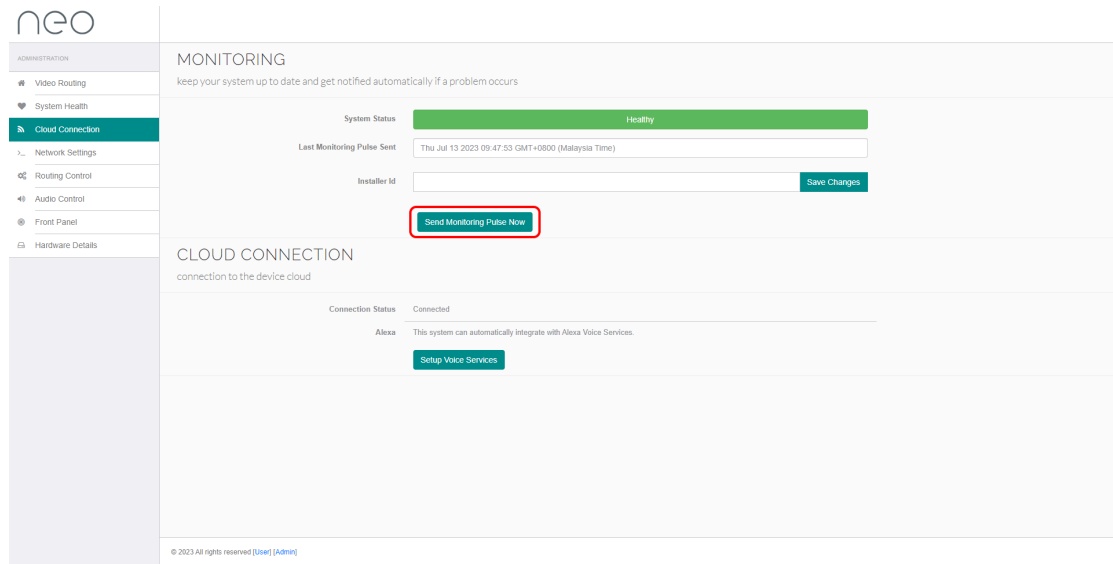

For example: If your firmware is on 3.1, we would advise updating to 3.3, then 3.5 rather than going straight from 3.1 to 3.5
To clarify this is no more than 2 available versions. For example it is safe to update from 3.5 to 3.9 as 3.6-3.8 was not officially released and therefore will not cause any issues to your update.

If you want the update to apply to the unit sooner rather than waiting for the unit to next phone home, you can 'send a monitoring pulse' by logging into gotomymatrix.com and sending the Pulse from the Cloud Connection menu on the left once you have logged into the admin section (If you have not previously accessed this area, please consult your Pulse-Eight installation guide for the password.)

By pressing the 'send monitoring pulse now' button, the unit will immediately phone home and the update will be applied.



Alternatively you can contact Pulse-Eight support who offer 24 hour support Monday-Friday and they can apply the firmware update for you.

⚠ WARNING: While the update is being applied, please DO NOT turn off or reboot your unit or network connection. As part of the process, the unit will reboot itself. If the unit loses power or a network connection during the update, the update may fail or the unit's existing firmware may be lost.

TROUBLESHOOTING

Should you encounter installation difficulties or issues with device communication, the following checklist of common issues and causes should help resolve your issues. If you still continue to experience issues, please contact your local representative for further assistance.

No or Poor Picture Quality

- Connected and powered? Double check that all HDMI®, Ethernet and power cables are firmly connected to the correct ports and all devices are correctly powered.
- Cable length? Are you approaching the maximum distance of the Cat cable (e.g. 100m) if so, try adjusting the picture resolution/format, or try using an additional extender kit on the HDMI® output to go further distance. Cables bundled together may cause cross-talk and further degrade signal quality.
- Signal strength? The use of cable joins, stranded patch panels, wall outlands and stranded patch leads as interconnects between them can significantly reduce signal strength. Use solid core straight through connections wherever possible.
- If you reduce the resolution of the source (e.g. from 4K to 1080p), do you get a picture? If so, this suggests a conflicting resolution between source and display or a bandwidth capacity issue with your cable. Check all inputs and outputs share the same resolution capabilities.
- Picture 'snow' / HD 'noise' signifies a failure to fully establish a signal and can often be caused by poorly terminated RJ45 connectors or excess cable lengths. Ensure your cable is correctly wired to 568B standards.
- Pink or off-colour picture? This could be caused by an invalid EDID or the source device failing to read the EDID from the matrix. Try re-booting matrix and all source devices to force the re-reading of the EDID.
- Cable quality and condition - HDMI® cable/connectors can easily be damaged and the quality of material can vary. Always use good quality leads and cables and try swapping cables that are known to be working into the solution to see if this improves your image.

EDID Handshake

There may be times you will need to perform an EDID Handshake on your Matrix. This is often after a new piece of equipment has been introduced to your setup or any changes have occurred.

To do an EDID Handshake:

1. Turn off the Matrix and all Sources
2. Turn on all TVs, and make sure these are not set to standby
3. Wait 45 seconds
4. Power on Matrix and wait for x3 Green Lights on the front panel
5. Wait a further 45 seconds
6. Turn on all sources

No Sound on Speaker

Make sure that you are setting the matrix to Sink or Source mode and that the wiring is correct.

For a Linked Device (ProAmp8), check the following:

1. When you first install the matrix, the unit is in Sink mode passive. You need to change it to 'active' to get control of volume.
2. Make sure the port is linked to the correct one (please see step 5 in the Linked Device section).
3. Toggle the ARC settings between HDMI®, Optical & Disabled (please see step 6 in the Linked Device section).

 *Note: This occurs only when using S/PDIF & Digital Coax outputs. Analog Stereo outputs are not affected.*

Infrared Not Functioning

1. Make sure to use the compatible IR flasher/receiver for this video matrix.
2. Check and see if the LED beside the IR port is lighting up. It signifies whether the IR connection is working.
3. If the IR bud is not receiving or transmitting, test it out with a different port or swap with another IR bud to deduce the problem

📖 *Note: Do not mix and match 12V or 5V to different video matrixes as they could cause irreparable damage.*

IR Control

- Are the IR emitters and receivers correctly positioned to allow infrared signals to be transmitted and received? Emitters should be fixed firmly over infrared sensors of sources. Receivers should be attached or next to displays ensuring a clear line of sight to the remote control used to operate. Each IR port has an LED, when correctly installed the LED will flash red/green when IR is transmitting or receiving.
- Is your remote control powered and sending a signal? As IR is invisible to the naked eye, a good trick to check whether your remote is transmitting a signal is by viewing the remote handset sensor through a digital camera/camera phone. The sensor should flash when a button on the handset is held down and this is not supported by all phone cameras.
- IR signal dropout can be experienced due to exterior emissions of infrared radiation. Ensure emitters and receivers are away from direct sunlight. Halogen lighting and plasma screens may also interfere with IR signals.

Can't See Other Unit When Going to Link The Devices

1. Make sure both neo:X+ and the ProAmp8 are connected to the local network. The system needs to detect each other to make the linking possible.
2. If both units are on the latest firmware and it's still not visible, please try the following:
 - a hard refresh (CTRL + R or CTRL F5)
 - run on another web browser
 - Or, clear the cache for your web browser.

Linked Device Option Is Not Available or Visible

Update both ProAmp8 & neo:X+ to the latest firmware and perform a power cycle (reboot both).
